"For Auld Lang Syne and Days to Come"

In May of 2013, the American adaptation of the television series, *The Office*, aired its series finale which was cleverly titled, "Finale." During that heart-string-pulling episode, the character Andy Bernard, played by actor, Ed Helms, reflected on the many memories of his years at the Scranton, PA branch of Dunder Mifflin Paper Company (true fans would demand that I mention the fictional Sabre Electronics division to that title). In that moment of sentimentality, Andy says: "*I wish there was a way to know you're in the good old days before you've actually left them.*"

I was thinking about those words the other day as I was surrendering to the speed at which the 2023 new year seems to be approaching (though, it will have arrived by the time you read this). Andy's reflection actually got me thinking a bit about how we can approach the new year, specifically this time around the sun. What if, instead of approaching this year as if it is just another year – a year of our lives, a year of our careers, a year of our relationships... perhaps a year of our ministries? – what if we approached it as *THEE* year of our ministry as church? *THEE* year of our lives as family people, relational people, even working people. In other words, what might happen if we approach 2023 as if it was already a year that we'd remember with excitement for all our lives to come?

To do this, we have to first accept a few nuances:

1. It is safe to say that 2023 will not be perfect! We need to anticipate that there will be moments of disappointment and dissatisfaction during the year. There will also be moments of heartbreak and seemingly failure. This is part of life and is unavoidable. That said, how we approach those inevitable challenges makes all the difference! If we go into January 1st expecting 2023 to be a fruitful and special year in our lives, then we can approach difficulties with a reminder within ourselves that God has already overcome anything that seems insurmountable. The grief we'll face, the loss we'll experience – it doesn't get to define us! Perhaps we can reflect on these words from the Gospel of John,

"In the world you have distress. But be encouraged! I have conquered the world." -John 16:33 (CEB)

2. We have to put some energy into making it true! Like with planning our New Year's resolutions, we sometimes forget that nothing magical happens as we hang our new calendars on the wall or as we watch the ball drop in New York City. If I resolve to eat better, I have to actually change my grocery shopping habits. The calendar won't step in to start making me kale salads, much as I might want it to. And yet, we mark time by dates and years, and so we can certainly enter 2023 with a desire to make it special. But then we have to join forces with God to begin doing something to make 2023 special and memorable for all the right reasons. IF this is the year that we're going to see ministry at GBUMC flourish, then we all have to, not only get excited about that, but we have to start *making* it happen!







In Harper Lee's book, *To Kill a Mockingbird,* the author tells the story of how Jem, just a young lad, lopped off the tops of the of Mrs. Dubose's camellias. As punishment, Jem was required to read to her until her alarm went off, and she kept extending the time. Later, we learn that the time was extended so that Mrs. Dubose could gradually increase her time off of morphine. She was sick and she wanted to die morphine free. Jem's father, Atticus, described her actions as true "courage."

Reading to seniors may have been more commonplace then (the story is set in the South during the 1930s). But it's a good idea. It involves seniors in good stories that can be developed over a period of weeks, and it also gives them human contact and opportunities to chat about other things as a part of the visit.

Many seniors are no longer able to read. But, while their eyesight may be failing, their hearing may be fine and their imaginations are still intact! That's why the power of words, metaphor and simile still speakeven to the homebound. By Timothy Merrill for HomeTouch Quarterly

For the elderly, falling is a cause for concern.

About 1/3 of the senior population over the age of 65 falls each year. The percentage grows proportionately with age. More than half of the elderly who are 80 years old will fall at least once every year.

Those who fall are two to three times more likely to fall again.

About half (53%) of the older adults who are discharged for fall-related hip fractures will experience another fall within six months.

A large percentage of non-injured fallers (47%) cannot get up without assistance.

Falling can happen to anyone.

The late evangelist Billy Graham once fell, breaking his left hip. He needed extensive physical therapy. Dr. Robert Atkins, of the famous Atkins Diet, was not as fortunate. He fell, slipping on a patch of ice, and died shortly thereafter in a New York-area hospital. Katharine Graham, former publisher of *The Washington Post*, also died of complications suffered from a head injury following a fall.

These falls often involve a broken hip. Falling and breaking hips, arms and legs is a serious problem for the elderly. Not only do they suffer from decreased mobility, but the fear of falling keeps them from living an otherwise normal life.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, one in four Americans 65 and older falls each year. "In 2018 alone, seniors reported nearly 36 million falls, 8.4 million of which resulted in fall-related injuries. Sadly, more than 32,000 elders died from falling that year." More than 300,000 fractured hips were caused by falls, and many of these victims were disabled as a result.

Why is this important to a congregation?

This is important because people who are in contact with the elderly, as most churches are, can be aware of the dangers of falls, and keep their eyes open for potential problems, both in their church facility and in the homes of their elderly members.

Are their large throw rugs lying around? These can be slippery and dangerous.

Are rooms and hallways properly lit with night lights?

Are handrails available?

Do slippers and shoes have rubber soles?

Have they had their vision checked lately? Vision is important to senior, and sometimes they neglect to get their eyeglass prescriptions updated. If you can't see well, you will trip over unseen objects.

This information was provided by HomeTouch, which provides the print materials that we send out to our homebound members each week. Do you know of someone that would benefit from receiving a devotional reading and entertaining puzzles each week? Please let the office know!
